


#### **OSU Revenues Are Increasing**




- Despite a decline in the State appropriation from 2010 to 2011, total revenues increased from 743 million to 787 million
- Tuition revenue increased 28 million from 2010 to 2011

## **OSU Had a \$28 Million Profit in 2011**





- IPEDS = Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System of the US Department of Education
- This examines just salaries within each category
- Auxiliaries is dominated by athletics
- Student services and academic support have significant administrative components
- Institutional support is pure upper-level administration
- Notice how instruction is almost at the bottom

- We see the growth in top administrators has been positive, but there has been a decline in faculty. This needs to be explained.
- Given that there was an increase in administrative pay from 2010 to 2012, the trends towards administration has been consistent
- The secretarial classification has taken the biggest hit over this time.
