What is Institutional Awarding?

The act of awarding a degree to a student upon completion of their stated degree requirements in lieu of waiting for a student to apply to graduate.

What does this mean for OSU?

More students will graduate each year (yes- students actually don't realize they need to apply to graduate).

OSU will track and guide students earlier rather than waiting for them to apply to graduate.

Closing the gap between the first-year experience and the "last mile" by working backwards (years 4, 3, 2...) to give advisors better reports on student degree progression.

Improved compliance with federal financial aid regulatory requirements.

Advising and the Office of the Registrar will partner even more than we currently do.

What action is required?

Four areas will require change:

- 1. Policy/regulations
- 2. Cultural shift
- 3. Process changes
- 4. Technical support
