## Syllabus Minimum Requirements - Proposed revisions

A syllabus is required for all locations (Corvallis, Cascades, Hatfield, La Grande, Portland) and all modalities (Ecampus, hybrid, lecture/lab) the course will be taught.

Course proposals require a syllabus\* to be attached under Documents in the proposal. For Baccalaureate Core course proposals, a syllabus must be uploaded for each location and each modality the course will be taught, including when only one version (location or modality) is being added or changed. For all other courses, only one syllabus is required but the Graduate Council and/or Curriculum Council may request additional syllabi if either Council feels additional information is needed before moving the proposal forward in the curricular review process. Special Topics (e.g., X99), Blanket Numbered (e.g. 401-410), and Experimental (X) courses do not require a syllabus to be attached to these proposals. Each syllabus should include the following information:

- o **Course Name:** For example, Introduction to Statistics
- o Course Number: For example, ST 101
- Course Credits: Include the number of credit hours the course meets per week/term in lecture, recitation, laboratory, etc. In the case of online courses, please comment on the number of hours on average that students will interact with course materials. For example, "This course combines approximately 90 hours of instruction, online activities, and assignments for 3 credits."
- Prerequisites, Corequisites and Enforced Prerequisites: See the following link to Prerequisite

- Course Description: This should be 100 words or less. Avoid phrases such as "This course is
  designed to...," "Students will learn..." Do not use pronouns in the Course Description. See
  the Course Description policy and the Writing Course Descriptions page for more information.
- Course Content: Include concise outline of topics and/or activities.
- Course Specific Measurable Student Learning Outcomes: See Student Learning Outcomes for a definition and instructions. (For Slash 4XX/5XX courses, list appropriate distinctions in outcomes, instructional opportunities, and evaluation procedures between the undergraduate 4XX and graduate 5XX versions of the course.) For online (Ecampus) courses, student learning outcomes must be identical to those in the on-campus course, even though the mode of delivery and course content might differ.
- Baccalaureate Core Category course requirements: All Bacc Core course syllabi must include the following requirements: (The Bacc Core Committee strongly suggests that the final three requirements associated with the second, third, and fourth bullets be placed together within a matrix table)
  - Each syllabus must include verbatim: "This course fulfills the Baccalaureate Core requirement for the [category name] category."
  - Each syllabus must include the 3 relevant category learning outcomes verbatim in an explicitly identified and labeled list which is located near the course fulfillment statement (see above).
  - Every syllabus must make a direct, clearly stated connection between each listed Bacc Core category learning outcome and specific attributes of the course content. The level of detail used should make it evident to students how different aspects of the course fulfill the specific category learning outcomes.

- Every syllabus must make clear to students how the Bacc Core category learning outcomes will be assessed within the course. Assessments need to be described in enough detail that the connection between assessment method and learning outcome is apparent. (simply stating "exam, quizzes, homework, class discussion" will not provide enough detail)
- o Writing Intensive Curriculum (WIC): Each syllabus must also make it clear that:
  - Individual writing comprises at least 25% of the course grade
  - Students individually write and revise (after feedback) at least 2,000 words in formal, graded writing - about 10 pages
  - Revision of the 2,000-word formal writing is required, not optional
  - The total word count for formal writing is at least 4,000 words (2,000 counted for the draft and 2,000 counted for the final copy)
  - Informal, ungraded writing comprises about 1,000 words (or enough to make the total word count at least 5,000)
- Synthesis courses At a minimum, the course should include a single out-of-class written assignment with a minimum of 1250 words plus references that develops and sustains a critical perspective using evidence as support and a multidisciplinary approach. The assignment should include at least 2 outside sources.

- **Evaluation of Student Performance:** In the OSU online catalog, refer to <u>AR 18 and AR 19</u> regarding assignment of grades.
- Learning Resources: Textbooks, lab manuals, etc.; indicate if required or optional.
- Include the following paragraph: "Statement Regarding Students with Disabilities:
   Accommodations for students with disabilities are determined and approved by Disability Access
   Services (DAS). If you, as a student, believe you are eligible for accommodations but have not
   obtained approval please contact DAS immediately at 541-737-4098 or
   at <a href="http://ds.oregonstate.edu">http://ds.oregonstate.edu</a>. DAS notifies students and faculty members of approved academic
   accommodations and coordinates implementation of those accommodations. While not required,
   students and faculty members are encouraged to discuss details of the implementation of individual
   accommodations."

via Online Services. Course evaluation results are extremely important and used to help improve courses and the learning experience of future students. Responses are anonymous (unless a student chooses to "sign" their comments agreeing to relinquish anonymity) and unavailable to instructors until after grades have been posted. The results of scaled questions and signed comments go to both the instructor and their unit head/supervisor. Anonymous (unsigned) comments go to the instructor only.
