

Students Taking Academic Responsibility (STAR): University-wide Academic Intervention for First Year Students



Data Analysis Team:

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STAR Pilot Overview

- Prior to Fall 2012, inconsistent practices across campus
- Committee created by Susie Brubaker-Cole to develop campus-wide intervention
- STAR is now entering its 2nd full year as a campus-wide effort to support first-year students who fall into negative academic standing
- Includes students whose GPA falls below a 2.0 during their summer, fall, winter, or spring term of their first year at OSU

STAR Pilot Overview

- A registration hold is placed on their account and they are contacted by their home college's advising office to set up a one-on-one meeting with their academic advisor
- Intervention includes: Qualtrics survey, 1:1 advisor meeting & creation of an academic success plan or academic probation contract
- Total of 1,118 STAR-eligible students in 2013-2014

Student Population & Key Terms

- Negative Academic Standing/Academic Difficulty = Term or cumulative GPA below 2.0
- Good Standing = Term and cumulative GPA at or above 2.0
- Academic Recovery = Successfully moving from negative academic standing into Good Standing
- STAR Population = First-year, fully matriculated, degree seeking, Corvallis Campus, Negative Academic Standing (currently excludes Transfer students)



How Many First Year Students Experience Academic Difficulty?

In 2013-2014, **1118** Full-Time and Part-Time First Year Students Experienced at Least one term of Academic Difficulty (Term or Cumulative GPA < 2.0)



- At least one term in Negative Standing during their first year
- Good Standing for all terms during their first year

How do we know if the STAR Intervention is Helping Students?

Outcomes:

- Academic Recovery Rate
- Retention Rate

Timeline:


Fall-to-Fall

Comparison Between Groups:

- Control: Fall 2011 Pre STAR 367 students
- *Treatment:* Fall 2013 Full STAR Participants 372 students

How does the STAR Population Recovery & Retention Compare to the Control Groups?

2013-2014 Comparing STAR and non-STAR Student Academic Recovery and First Year Retention



What is the Impact of STAR in terms of Number of Students and First Year Retention?


First Year Students in Negative Standing: Fall 2011: 367

Fall 2013 (STAR Treatment): 372

Difference of +53 students with STAR Treatment.

That translates to more than a 1% increase in the first year retention rate from one term's intervention.



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Moving Forward with the STAR Program

- Formalize the program: FTE for advisors and a Program Coordinator
- Expand the program
- Increase collaboration and data collection across campus for tutoring and support programs with STAR
- Continue to encourage students to use support resources
